

Both activities train industry professionals about the art of hair coloring and extensions as well as business operations, marketing, branding and social media. Edmonds' passion for determining the root cause of hair loss led to his partnership with Stuart Edmondson, LLC – which provides customized hair loss solutions and products for men, women, and children. And, he has created LITC Society Hair – affordable Virgin Indian and Brazilian hair extensions, geared toward natural textures.

Jamal's artistry has been published in The Business of Professional Modeling, a book featuring more than 100 industry professionals; on the cover of Washington Life Magazine and featured in multiple editorial spreads in Essence Magazine. Other print credits include Black Hair U.K., Dolce, Latest Magazine and Sophisticate's Black Hair, respectively.

Jamal has been hired for countless events and campaigns such as New York Fashion Week; BET Upfront promotional tours; and "Black Girls Rock!" and BET Awards programs. He has provided his hair care expertise to numerous famous tresses, including Terrence Howard, actor; Debra Lee, former chairman and CEO, Black Entertainment Television (BET); Eva Marcille, model, actress and television personality; Bevy Smith, television and radio personality; Angie Stone and Elle Varner, Grammy-nominated musicians; and Teyana Taylor, recording artist, actress, television personality, choreographer and dancer.

Edmonds continuously volunteers his time and knowledge to numerous charitable organizations and programs, including winter coat drives, Toys for Tots, holiday makeovers for the less fortunate, Breast Cancer Awareness Month and City Morale – an annual program which gifts wigs to cancer patients.
